A Reflection at the Intersection of the Year Ending and the Year Beginning

Jesus, in John 14:28, told his followers, "I am going away and I am coming back." The verbs in this statement are worth considering. Almost all translations keep them present tense, active. I am going away and I am coming back, almost as though the two things are simultaneous. My friend Birte (whom some of you met at my installation) once offered a sermon that reflected on this: she described going on a trip in which she used the same road to travel away and then return home. All of it active. All of it continuous. All of it embedded in change.

I am thinking today of the mystery of God and of change in our lives. At the end of the year, we are starting again. For a few weeks, we will get confused and write the date as 2019, but then we will get oriented to where we are in time and space and start writing 2020. Even though it is a new year, a year that we have never lived through before, we will recognize some things. We know our nearest and dearest and make dinner with them, meet up with our friends, celebrate birthdays. We recognize winter, spring, summer, fall. There is constant change, and there are rhythm and cycles. We are always going away from the familiar and coming back to what we know.

What does this teach us about God's place in all the change that comes with living? There are hints in the Bible that God, though steadfast, may change. God changes God's mind when Abraham asks for help in the wilderness. God changes God's mind when the Ninevites listen to Jonah's call to reform and God decides not to punish them.

All of which is to say that God's change is responsive, attentive. It is not abandonment. There is a saying attributed to Nicholas of Cusa from the 15th Century: "God is an infinite circle whose center is everywhere
